From John Lennon Airport: The Airlink 500 will leave us at the Dolby. I think the 82A is another option but we'll have to ask on arrival. In any case, there are buses every half hour to the city so we should be all right. A ticket costs about 2 Make sure you either have change or pay in groups of 3/4.

A cab is also an option. It would cost about £20-25, but we could share a cab among four or five.

The staff at the tourist information office is very helpful and provide information about transport, weather or strike action that we should take into account. You have the number below.

The City Explorer open-bus sightseeing tour is not booked since there is one every half hour starting at 10.00 and I did not want to risk missing it or a cancellation if the weather is very bad. Tours are generally guided and it is a way to get a very good impression of the city and its highlights. Concession is generally £9, but I called and a very nice lady (Anne) gave us a group discount so we are going to pay £7 each on the day of the tour We can pay by credit card. They have already taken note of our visit and the driver/guide will be expecting us. Let's hope the weather is good since if it is pouring with rain we would have to cancel. To go to Port Sunlight we will have to take the Merseyrail train (closest station is James Street): Wirral Line (green) – direction to Elsmere Port/Chester and stop at Port Sunlight. See a network map following this link:

It is a twenty minute ride, approximately. Also, take into account that the walk from the hotel to the station is of about 20/30 minutes (approximately).

We'll buy a **return ticket**, though we will stop at Lime Street Station on our way back (the return ticket is valid for all the Liverpool stations, that's why we do not have to specify the station we'll stop at on our way back, just say a return ticket to Port Sunlight). The price of a return ticket is £4.35.

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## ADDITIONAL INTERESTING TOURIST INFORMATION

Since you are at the Queens Dock and we'll visit the Albert Dock, you should not miss the Pier Head, one of the most impressive waterfront areas with three emblematic buildings: The Royal Liver Building, The Cunard Building and the Port of Liverpool Building, referred to as The Three Graces. Fortunately, we'll see that during our open bus tour ... weather permitting. If the weather is horrible and we cannot take the tour, do find a way to take a stroll there. A very early bird walk, for example?

We are located very close to the shopping area (Liverpool One) and there are many supermarkets and reasonably priced restaurants around. Ask at reception and they should be able to help. I am particularly fond of the Pret A Manger in Liverpool One, Paradise Street. But there are many others. And Bold Street has many interesting multicultural options. Check web page anyway for more info.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR EVENING ACTIVITIES:

There are galleries we do not have time to visit and which you may want to take into account when you come back to Liverpool in the future: The Beatles Story, Tate Liverpool, The Museum of Liverpool, and The World Museum. However, they are beyond our reach for a very intense two-day trip like ours. We cannot fit in the Anfield Stadium tour, which is very interesting and gives us history teachers the opportunity to explain things about Spion Kop and the Boer War and to delve into Thatcherite England and the backlash of the working classes after Hillsborough.

Consequently, I am only noting down some spots which are within our grasp. We are going to see most during the bus tour, but they are worth a stroll if you have the chance:

- ✓ Bold Street for pubs, restaurants, and two iconic bookshops: Forbidden Planet and News from Nowhere.
- ✓ At the top of the street there is also a church, St Luke's, that was bombed during the Blitz and which remains empty and roofless, a reminder of what happened and an iconic sight.
- The Gothic cathedral you can see from the hotel. It is very close nearby. You may not be able to go in since it closes quite early to the public but it is a tradition for visitors to walk in and look for a very particular mouse for good luck. They also have excellent views from the tower. And a mysterious whispering arch.
- Down the street from the Gothic cathedral, you go by the Chinese Arch and the Superlambanana. Don't ask and look for pictures. It is a dangerous creature so it is kept in a cage. You may approach it at your own risk. The Superlambanana likes kids, but she finds them difficult to digest!

✓	And you are a five-minute walk from Liverpool One, the shopping area. Full of life, street music and activity (at least before Covid), it was a favourite spot for most
	students. We teachers particularly love the Waterstones bookshop and Paperchase for stationary. And if you are a bibliophile freak I recommend you rummage the
	W.H. Smith bookshelves since they usually have interesting book discounts. Nostalgics may also want to step into HMV for music and DVD deals.
